

Mr. Gene Stock and Members of Bedford High School Hall Of Fame Committee:

To be nominated for the Bedford Hall of Fame is indeed an honor, and speaking for the team, let me say "thank you".

In 1963, Bedford was placed in the G.L.L. because we had no other league to compete in. The G.L.L. was perhaps the strongest or one of the strongest leagues in Ohio. Athletic teams in the league at that time were in the Top 10 in Ohio in all sporting endeavors. The league included; Whitmer, Clay, Rogers, Sylvania, Fostoria and Port Clinton. Our schedule also included a powerhouse Toledo St. Francis.

The team, "our team" was indeed blessed with outstanding pitching and that blessing made us competitive. Let me remind you that to win also needed hitting and defense and this team did all of that...

As I remember, the players practiced hard and were fun to be with. The Clay game was well in hand with a sizable lead when the rain stopped play. It was decided not to make up because it would not have altered the championship.

My congratulations to the team for being nominated as the players deserve this honor.
