

PAULINE TOLLY

Pauline Tolly began her career at Bedford Public Schools the Friday before the first day of school in 1956 as the secretary for Bedford High School Principal, Mr. Arthur Maschke. She served in that capacity for many years until she joined the staff of the newly formed Personnel Office where she remained until her retirement after 30 years of service to the staff and students of Bedford Public Schools. Even in her retirement, she remains excited to meet a Bedford graduate and learn about their accomplishments.

During her time at Bedford, she became a part of the Organization of Michigan School Secretaries. A few years after joining, she was elected and served as their president.

MARGERY SHINKLE

Margery H. Shinkle graduated from the University of Toledo and started teaching in Dearborn, Michigan in 1944. She first taught in Bedford at Banner Oak School, a one room school house, teaching the first four grades. She also taught elmentary students at Douglas Road Elementary and Temperance Road Elementary. Mrs. Shinkle served as an assistant principal at Temperance Road Elementary, before becoming the first female principal principal for Bedford Public Schools at Jackman Road Elementary. She retired after 30 years of service dedicated to the students of Bedford Public Schools.

She was married to Ted V. Shinkle for 65 years, has 4 sons, 8 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

THE BEGINNING OF A NEW SCHOOL

In August 1963, the Bedford Public Schools Board of Education selected a 40 acre piece of farmland belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Donald Brunt on the northwest corner of Dean and Jackman Roads to be the location of a new high school. It was chosen over eight other potential locations. The property was purchased for \$60,000 and the district contracted architects McLaughlin and Kiel of Lima, Ohio to draw up the plans for the new building. The project was financed by a \$2,350,000 bond approved by the voters on May 13, 1963 after being voted down twice before.

The existing high school building at 8486 Douglas, built in 1951, was overcrowded and students were attending on half day schedules and did so for 3 years. Junior high students were also attending on half day schedules at 1575 W. Temperance Road. Once the new high school opened in the Fall of 1965, the former high school would be used for junior high students.

On June 23, 1964, construction began. The new high school would be a series of wings, all connected. One corridor would be 600 feet long. With a capacity for 1,700 students, it would have 60 rooms including classrooms, lecture halls, study rooms, laboratories with \$21,000 of new equipment, a gymnasium designed with a seating capacity of 2,500 people, a separate 700 seat auditorium, cafeteria, and a vocational education wing with over \$100,000 worth of machinery. Machine shop courses and high school level art and music classes could now be offered for the first time.

After delays in approval from the Michigan public health department regarding sewers, an ironworker strike halting roof work, and other construction delays pushed back the first day of school three weeks, Principal Arthur Maschke was determined that the school should open "even if the busses sink in the mud and the kids sit on nail kegs!" The 1,086 students in grades 10–12 were delighted with the new school on their first day, September 27, 1965, even though the gymnasium, auditorium and music facilities remained to be completed.

In the years 50 years since that first day the students streamed into the new Bedford High School for the first day of class, many other changes have happened in this building and on its campus. Additions have been put on. A new stadium built. The evolution of technology has required new skills and changed the way students learn. Throughout it all, a tradition of excellence in education continues for the graduates of Bedford High School.
