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Many share memories of BHS during BHS 50th Anniversary

For those who attended Bedford High School's 50th Anniversary weekend, many smiles were shared remembering the first days of school at the new building.

For Beryl Preketes, a retired teacher, the new high school meant there was an expansion of classes that could be offered.

"I remember teaching art at the junior high and then teaching the first art class at the high school," Preketes, 91, said. "Everything was so new and the kids were excited."

The new high school on Jackman Road opened in 1965, replacing the former high school building on Douglas Road which opened in 1951.

As the district and Bedford community grew, the old high school was unable to hold all of its students at once. Classes were split, with upperclassmen and underclassmen occupying the building at different times.

Alice Preketes, a member of the class of 1966, the first graduating class, remembered the affect the new school had on her and her classmate's social life.

"I was a senior so it was nice to be in the new school," she said. "We were going half days before then so when the school opened we were able to be with all of our friends. There were many fun things including having a brand new theater department. We were able to be with our friends and I just liked the new school better."

Tom Chevalier, a member of the Class of 1968, and his wife Beth, class of 1970, came from their home in Seneca, South Carolina, to celebrate with old friends.

"I remember just how new it was and how exciting it was to be here," Tom said. "It was a beautiful school back then and it still looks good now."

"We were high school sweethearts here so the school holds many memories for me," Beth said. "There was always a lot of school spirit here and there still is."

Bill Orth, class of 1967, said he enjoyed the weekend, especially having the chance to catch up with former classmates.

"It was really good to see old friends," Orth said. "I grew up across the street and remember watching it being built. It was like having a new toy around. I remember riding go-carts and building forts here. I just have a lot of great memories here."

According to Edd Bankow-ski, co-chair of the 50th Anniversary Celebration Committee, the weekend was really meant to be a tribute to the whole school system.

"We are celebrating 'Excellence in Education,' " Bankowski said. "I remember the newness of the school and the fact that physical education was held in a classroom. The gym was not done yet so that, to me, was the only downside. I have a lot of great memories here. Now, the high school really is a great place to be." On Friday, and as part of the BHS homecoming, there was a showcase including the Mules Marching Band with added alumni majorettes and marchers. Across from the entrance to the stadium, two large tents were filled with graduates, food service, and a place for all former Mules to mingle. On Saturday everyone had the opportunity to walk the halls once again, to reminisce and to view classic memorabilia. While the school was open for a visit, an alumni band and choir were rehearsing for an afternoon celebration program. Saturday's activities included an open house at the high school and a reception in the junior high cafeteria. There was also a concert and a program on the history of the schools. Former Choir Director, C. David Parker, was also thrilled to come home to BHS. While at the high school, Parker saw 400 students a day between choir, Varsity (Story continued on page 8; Pictures continued on page 6)



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DRE needs help from volunteers for community build playground project

Two years ago, shortly after Hunter Gandee successfully carried his younger brother Braden on the Cerebral Palsy Swagger to Ann Arbor to raise Cerebral Palsy awareness, the brothers embarked on another project. This project was to have a handicap-accessible playground constructed at Braden's school, Douglas Road Elementary (DRE), so that Braden could play on the playground with his classmates as well as the availability for other kids with mobility difficulties in the community to use the playground.

After fundraising and seeking grants, the playground is set to become a reality. DRE PTA President Donnie Stevens said that they have almost reached the fundraising goal of \$175,000 to purchase Phase 1, which is the largest part of the project.

Ground has been broken and site preparation is being finished. The cost of installation would have been \$50,000 so it was decided to have the unassembled playground delivered and to use a crew of volunteers for a community build to assemble the 2,000 pieces of the play structure.

Assembly work began on Monday, October 5, with shifts of two to three hours available through Saturday, October 10 with an option of additional days if needed. Volunteers needed include: a contractor, team leaders and workers that are comfortable with the use of tools. There are also a couple of smaller portions of the playground that will require their own team, such as a high stepper and a double swing and painting.

If you are unable to help with the build but still want to be of assistance, food donations are needed. Donations of prepackaged snacks, chips, cookies, Gatorade, water, etc. can be dropped off at the Douglas Road Elementary office between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

"Please consider giving a day, or a few hours, of your time in one of these areas. Plenty of hands will be needed over the course of this build and we will welcome any and all help," Stevens stated. "Help us fulfill the dream of an all inclusive playground for children at DRE and our surrounding community."
