James B. Jankow

TEMPERANCE, James H. Jankow, 31, of Sand Creek Dr., who also once
played professional baseball
in the Boston Red Sox and
Baltimore Orioles franchises,
died Monday night in his
home.

Dr. David J. Lieberman,
Monroe County medical ex-
aminer, ruled cause of death
an self-inflicted gunshot
wound.

p.m. Wednesday in the
Parham Funeral Home,
Temperance, where services
will be at 11 a.m. Thursday.
The Rev. William Paul of St.
Paul's Lutheran Church,
Temperance, will officiate,
and burial will be in Whitesboro
Union Cemetery, Whitesboro
Township.

The son of James and Jean
(Carter) Jankow, he was born
July 21, 1948, in Detroit,
moving to the area with his
parents 20 years ago. Mr.
Jankow was one of the first
players to be signed by the
Boston Red Sox franchise
under the college scholarship
plan adopted by the major
leagues.

He graduated from Hurford
High School in 1963, and
entered Michigan State
University. In the fall of 1963,
he enrolled at the University
of Toledo, and graduated from
there in 1968. While at TU, he
was a member of the Theta
Chi fraternity.

In addition to playing in the
Red Sox system, Mr. Jankow,
a pitcher, played for three
years in the Baltimore Orioles'
minor league system.

Recently, he had been
employed as a salesman for
the Clark Lin-Truck Co. in
Toledo.

Surviving are his parents,
with whom he lived, and a
sister, Mrs. Bruce (Jeanifer)
Holby of Sand Creek.
